


LESSON PLAN ONE:

INTRODUCTION TO JUNK KOUTURE

RESOURCES:

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- Understand the concept of Junk Kouture and what is involved in the process
- Identify and explore materials and techniques which were used in past Junk Kouture projects
- Suggest alternative materials and techniques which creators could use

INTRODUCTION:

- Whole class watch Junk Kouture Student Overview video
- Educator shares programme timeline and checklist with creators and gives them each a copy for their Junk Kouture folder
- Whole class watch CPD Chapter 3 Junk Kouture for Students

DEVELOPMENT:

- Whole class visits Junk Kouture website. Access 'Gallery' section. Focus on 3 designs to explore materials and
- Creators work in groups of 3 with one iPad/PC per group. They are each given 3 designs to investigate
- Creators will list all the materials and techniques which they think were used in selected designs on the Junk Kouture template provided



SAMPLE QUESTIONS:

- What do you think the Junk Kouture programme might involve?
- What materials and techniques were used which surprised you?

CLOSURE:

- Groups share materials and techniques they noticed with the class, educator records
- Discussion about scope of materials and techniques for this project



- What unusual materials would you be interested in exploring? 1.
- Are there any techniques you have seen and would like to learn?






LESSON PLAN TWO:

MOOD BOARD

RESOURCES:



LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- Understand the benefits of creating a mood board
- · Know how to collect suitable assets for the mood board
- To create a mood board which represents a chosen style (formal, every day, red carpet, theatre, etc.)

INTRODUCTION:

- In pairs, creators share their ideas of what a mood board is and what it's benefits are
- Educator shares definition for mood board, whole class discuss
- Whole class watch Junk Kouture Mood Board tutorial



SAMPLE QUESTIONS:

- 1. What do you think the purpose of the mood board is?
- 2. How beneficial do you think a mood board is in the design journey? Why?

DEVELOPMENT:

- Educator shares tips for choosing images/ideas to include in mood board
- · Creators will begin to scan magazines to find images and ideas which could represent their chosen style
- Creators will add images to their mood board including elements of colour, style, shape, brands, etc. They are also free to
 include some text, sample material and other ideas where possible



SAMPLE QUESTIONS:

- 1. What style does your mood board represent?
- 2. Do you think this mood board would be a support to you if you were creating a Junk Kouture design of this style?

CLOSURE:

- · Creators will present their mood board to the person beside them discussing their chosen style and assets (images) included
- · The creators will share how any new ideas or learnings they might have for creating their Junk Kouture mood board
- · Creators will add the mood board sample along with notes of key learnings to Junk Kouture Locker
- Mood board: to visually illustrate the direction of a new idea. A mood board is used to collect ideas (images, fabrics, colours) and help generate concepts on a specific style





LESSON PLAN THREE:

SKETCHING

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- Creators will match original sketches to final designs and discuss similarities/differences
- Begin sketching design ideas for their Junk Kouture design
- Apply key learnings from tutorial to their own sketching

INTRODUCTION:

- Educator shares purpose of sketching with creators and discusses the importance of sketching
- Whole class examine past design sketches and match to finished design image. Creators discuss sketching technique, representation of materials and the evolution of design from sketch to final product
- Watch the Junk Kouture Sketching video. This video can be paused at any stage to discuss some key talking points



SAMPLE QUESTIONS:

- What is the purpose of a design sketch?
- Can you see much design evolution from sketch to final design? What are the key features of development?

DEVELOPMENT:

- Creators examine their Junk Kouture mood board to recall inspiration and ideas
- Creators begin sketching some Junk Kouture design ideas using the Junk Kouture sketching template. This step can be done individually, or in a group. This can be a flat sketch or a three-dimensional illustration. The more detail, the better



- What key ideas/features will you be sure to carry from your mood board through to your sketching?
- 2. How will you capture movement/shape/form in your sketch?

CLOSURE:

- Creators will share some initial design sketches with group discussing key features of their work
- Creators keep all designs in the Locker for future reference. Key sketches can be added to the Junk Kouture mood board
- Drawing a fashion figure is the first step in bringing the design to life- a template for the designer's vision. The challenge for today is to sketch out a design which you would like to create. This can be a flat sketch or a three dimensional illustration. The more detail, the better.





LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- · Understand the purpose of stitching
- Recognise 3 different types of stitching
- Produce sample of stitch technique being explored in the lesson

INTRODUCTION:

- · Educator shares Junk Kouture Safety Information, give a copy to each creator for Locker.
- Whole class engages with Junk Kouture Sewing video. Educator pauses to highlight the name and features of each stitch mentioned
- · Educator asks creators to recall name and features of the backstitch



SAMPLE QUESTIONS:

- 1. What is the name of the stitch we will be focussing on today?
- 2. How would you recognise this stitch?

DEVELOPMENT:

- Educator shares the Junk Kouture step by step guide to the backstitch with creators. Discuss. Guide to the backstitch is on display for creators to refer to throughout the lesson
- Educator distributes needles, thread and scrap fabric to creators reminding them of the Junk Kouture Safety Information
- · Creators begin experimenting with the scrap fabric to perform the backstitch



SAMPLE QUESTIONS:

- 1. What are the key points to remember in terms of safety when using needles?
- 2. What other materials could you use this sewing technique on?

CLOSURE:

- Creators return all materials to designated area in a safe manner. They will share success and future goals for sewing with group
- · Creators keep some samples of their work in their Junk Kouture Locker
