Inspired by legendary female characters in fairy tales and myths, "Fallen Angel" tells a captivating story of inner strength and unwavering goodness. With every stitch the designer has woven together, tells a narrative that reminds us all, that light can shine through even the darkest of times.

MATERIALS USED

Made from black sheets of packaging foam, silver foils, damaged decorations from kids' parties, playing cards, a t-shirt, a hoop skirt from a costume and diamonds from left over craft materials.

DESIGN DESCRIPTION

As the team are interested in art and design they were greatly inspired by Missoni - through her unique creations. The team wanted to incorporate colourful patterns and designs into the dress, therefore organised the tags into their various range of colours. When creating the headpiece, they wanted to embrace shape and movement and decided to make 4 long trails of 528 white tags. When drilling each individual tag they drilled 12 holes, 8 for purpose and 4 for design adding decorative appearance.

MATERIALS USED

Made from 7 bags weighing 10kg of un-recyclable tags.

DESIGN DESCRIPTION

This design was created using 100s of individually cut out plastic circles. It is designed in a classic silhouette taking inspiration from the work of Iris Van Herpen, particularly her Fall 2021 collection. The team cut each circle out in different sizes, sprayed them gold and green and then riveted them together using gold pins. The team repurposed a gold mesh bathroom curtain into the skirt and added more circles to the bottom to make this elegant piece. Broken embroidery hoops and circles were used to create the headpiece. They used green to represent the envy we feel towards a world without pollution.

MATERIALS USED

Made from plastic shoe boxes, gold pins, an old bathroom curtain and embroidery hoops.

The design uses the original materials of pool noodles and pool inflatables to raise awareness around the issue of non-biodegradable plastics entering all of our water systems from household supply to the sea! The irony is that items we use to learn how to be safe in the water and to enjoy water in our leisure time, are actually destroying this precious amenity. My hand-sewn design is an inspiration showing 'Bridgerton' meets Marie-Antoinette.

MATERIALS USED

Pool noodles and pool inflatables, cleaned and manipulated into a hand-made corset, skirt, wig, and shoes, bikini, shorts, baseball cap, espadrilles, and wire.

Theo's inspiration was heavily influenced by the elaborate and intricate Venetian masks and the mysterious plague doctor masks while also by the opulent and extravagant fashion of the rococo era in France. To bring his vision to life, he incorporated elements from the iconic painting "Marie Antoinette in a white chemise dress"

MATERIALS USED

Waste from vaccine centres (vaccine caps, vaccine vials, and needle caps), a wedding dress and cardboard.

DESIGN DESCRIPTION

The top of the dress consists of mesh and tent materials to make panels for a corset and a combination of mini scale style milk-filter socks, crunched tents and CDs to decorate. The structure of the skirt was made with aluminium pipes and seatbelts. The base of the skirt was an old bedsheets tied together with 475 milk-filter socks. Approx 200 flowers which consist of over 1600 hand cut and singed petals. And finally, the head piece and shoes were made from a 25m garden hose and 3D printed snake head, decorated with onion netting and hand painted with details.

MATERIALS USED

Tents, filter socks, garden hose, aluminium pipe, copper wire, bedsheets, builders' helmet, heels, and a duvet cover form a charity shop, a steel flat bar, scrap wood, recycled plastic for 3D printing, CDs, ribbon, lace from a bra, onion bags and scrap wire.

Made mostly from domestic household items - beads, bingo cards, wool, sticks of willow, old denim & fabrics, paint and curtains.

MATERIALS USED

Made from discarded, broken, and unused building materials such as copper taken from old electrical wiring and a copper water cylinder, nuts and bolts, rusted corrugated iron, high-vis jacket, disused landscape netting, tool mats, gears, plastic medical tubing and a dismantled grandfather clock.

Drawing from the rich tapestry of both European and Asian cultures, this piece is a contemporary twist on time-honoured traditions. Crafted with an eclectic mix of materials — think repurposed tonne bags, eco-friendly wool, revamped curtains, and an assortment of found objects like keys and vintage jewellery — each of the 400 hand-sewn triangles tells a story, all woven into a patchwork of history on upcycled bed sheets.

MATERIALS USED

Made from bags, sustainable wool, up-cycled curtains, curtain rings, wires, keys, old jewellery, 400 triangular shaped hand stitched pieces and bed sheets.

DESIGN DESCRIPTION

The Ragnor Rí is a King of Norse/Celtic origin. Inside a dragon headed throne, a horned crown of Celtic engraved spikes sits over the head. A leather breast plate of over 90 individually hand cut, and carved leather scales are sewn under a large faux fur cloak with a Norse calendar hand carved on a shoulder plate. Two arm plates are embellished with recycled studs and Celtic knots. The Kilt of green and brown furs are decorated with strips of timing belts. The boots are fur lined and laced to the front with gold Celtic knots on the side. The leather toe caps slide on hand carved Celtic designs. The design is a adapted meet the mobility and wear ability needs of a wheel chair user.

MATERIALS USED

Made from recycled faux furs (plastic fibre), leather, curtains and clothes from an NCBI store, car timing belts, broken studs and buckles from a local shoemaker embellish the design and construction site waste materials were used on the throne and helmet.

The design's theme is space specifically linked to stars. Many people see stars as something to wish on and dream upon. The designer chose this theme as space portrays itself as a beacon of hope. Furthermore, the idea came to mind from the passing of Comet C/2022 E3 earlier this year. Throughout the process of creating the design the designer had to learn and develop ways to make the dress wearable when the items used to make this could cause harm, This links to space as although it is harmful it is beautiful. Space links to sustainability as space can help Earth to improve its sustainability.

MATERIALS USED

Made from inner tubes of bikes, a dog cone, insulation for houses from housework, old fabrics sourced from secondhand stores and shoes that were too broken to wear outdoors.

DESIGN DESCRIPTION

The intention is to show women empowerment through Spanish culture. Throughout the process, their sewing by hand/machine as well as designing, weaving and textile manipulation skills were developed and learned to work as a team. The main colours of Spain, red and silver are the basis of the design. The torera is designed based on the iconic bullfighter uniform of Chanel. The skirt, fan and headpiece are inspired by flamenco icons like Lola Flores. Slideshows were used to represent Spanish flora and shiny elements to represent the Spanish sun.

MATERIALS USED

Made from school materials. Main material is velvet from violin cases. Also made from tin tabs, keyboard keys, CDs, slideshows, old stationery, rubbish/chip/sweet bags, coffee capsules and plastic cutlery.

DESIGN DESCRIPTION

The team decided to take advantage of their location in the South of France and take inspiration from their surroundings when creating this dress. The design process was heavily influenced by the colours and textures of the natural surroundings, such as the ocean. As well as by the French fashion tradition of effortless elegance. They envisioned a wide skirt that would evoke the spirit of the Mediterranean Sea and the warmth of the sun. Ultimately, the sustainable top and skirt embodies a commitment to preserving the natural beauty of our surroundings and to promoting a more sustainable future for fashion.

MATERIALS USED

Made from soda can tabs, bottle caps collected on a beach cleanup, old laundry baskets, donated magazines no longer in use, cardboard boxes from school renovation, old fishing rope and string from collaboration with Nice Yacht Club and sea shells.

The design of the "Water Sensation" dress is a kind of illustration of polluted waters and the consequences on aquatic fauna... from glittering fish to plasticized fish trapped in the skirt.

MATERIALS USED

Made from materials to be recycled from bins and donations and the school's reserves, 350 buttons, 140 hand-sewn beads and red cabbage with soap was used for the dye.

Made form a plastic mannequin, a world map, plastic paper painted gold and ping pong balls.


DESIGN DESCRIPTION

The design is inspired by organic shapes and natural colours. Green and brown fabric was used for the skirt to make it resemble plants, moss and soil. The ropes on the top were dyed brown, sewn in swirling patterns, and hung off the dress to resemble roots. The design represents humans being taken over by nature & how powerful nature is by having the overgrown "plants' seemingly growing onto and covering the model. The moss-like headpiece helps make the model look less human by obscuring her identifying features and making her look more like she is part of nature.

MATERIALS USED

Made from a broken kite-surfing kite, woven strips of brown and green towels, clothes, carpets, curtains, shoelaces & other recycled fabric. I chose to represent the Wayuu tribe with recycled twine from my local florists who used it once to create holdings for flowers.


DESIGN DESCRIPTION

This design was made of white pleather upholstery and used VHS tapes. The white pleather upholstery is sourced from an upholstery company that shut down, so the remnants became up for grabs. The rigidity of the pleather contrasted well with the fragility of the VHS tapes. The used VHS tapes are from an old collection of the creator's teacher. The ideas and thoughts inside of the old recordings are now also a part of the design.
